GOD BLESS AMERICA



The Fourth of July—also known as Independence Day or July 4th—has been a federal holiday in the United States since 1941, but the tradition of Independence Day celebrations goes back to the 18th century and the American Revolution. On July 2nd, 1776, the Continental Congress voted in favor of independence, and two days later delegates from the 13 colonies** adopted the Declaration of Independence, a historic document drafted by Thomas Jefferson. From 1776 to the present day,

July 4th has been celebrated as the birth of American independence, with festivities ranging from <u>fireworks</u>, parades and concerts to more casual family gatherings and barbecues.

Did you know? John Adams believed that July 2nd was the correct date on which to celebrate the birth of American independence, and would reportedly turn down invitations to appear at July 4th events in protest. Adams and Thomas Jefferson both died on July 4, 1826—the 50th anniversary of the adoption of the Declaration of Independence.

Over the years, the political importance of the holiday would decline, but Independence Day remained an important national holiday and a symbol of patriotism.

Falling in mid-summer, the Fourth of July has, since the late 19th century, become a major focus of leisure activities and a common occasion for family get-togethers, often involving fireworks and outdoor barbecues. The most common symbol of the holiday is the American flag, and a common musical accompaniment is The Star-Spangled Banner," the national anthem of the United States.

^{**}Between 1607 and 1732, the British founded 13 colonies: Virginia, New York, Massachusetts, Maryland, Rhode Island, Connecticut, New Hampshire, Delaware, North Carolina, South Carolina, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, and Georgia. The colonists (left) face the British during the Revolutionary War.

Transfiguration:

The Feast Of Light and Glory Aug 6

In every liturgy of the Church, we address our prayers and thanksgiving to God who is described as "ineffable, inconceivable, invisible, incomprehensible, ever-existing and eternally the same." This kind of language - the language of prayer; points to God's majesty and transcendence while, at the same time, it conveys His presence. God is absolutely transcendent - beyond anything that we can know and experience - yet He is also present (immanent) and acts on behalf of us for our salvation.

The feasts of the Church not only remember certain special events, but make Christ present to us in those events through the power of the Holy Spirit.

In the feast of the Nativity of Christ, we see revealed to us the mystery of God's incarnation in the flesh. He reveals Himself to us as man while yet remaining God.

In the feast of Theophany, we see Christ revealed as the "Beloved Son" of God the Father. At Christ's baptism in the Jordan, God makes it clear that this man Jesus is truly the "Son of God."

As we prepare to celebrate the feast of the Transfiguration of Christ, we see Christ being revealed in all His divine glory.

The feast of - Metamorphosis - celebrated on August 6 - was introduced as a separate feast with all its major characteristics some time between the sixth and eighth centuries

The Fathers of the Church stress in their sermons that Jesus, when He was transfigured before His disciples, did not add anything to His nature that He did not possess before, but revealed what He already was. Jesus' humanity was not changed into divinity at the Transfiguration; He was divine, but in this event, His divine glory was revealed.

The appearance of Jesus with Moses and Elijah indicates that Jesus is the one whom the law and the prophets had looked toward. The past (Moses and Elijah), the present (the kingdom of God already here) and the future (crucifixion, resurrection and the world to come) make up the content of the event.

The early Fathers regarded the Transfiguration, like Theophany, as a sign of the transformation of human nature and of the reality of salvation. For salvation, they stressed, cannot be accomplished without the transfiguration of human nature by the power of God. The Transfiguration is also the day of the celebration of the deification (theosis) of human nature.

The Dormition of the Theotokos

Celebrated on August 15 (August 28)

The Feast of the Dormition or Falling Asleep of the Theotokos commemorates the death, resurrection, and glorification of Christ's mother. To help us in our preparation of the feast, it is preceded by a two week fast. As with the Nativity of the Virgin (September 8/21) and the feast of her Entrance to the Temple (November 21/December 4), the Feast of the Dormition also comes from the Tradition of the Church.

There we learn that Mary died as all people die because she had a mortal human nature affected by the corruption of this world. The Church proclaims that Mary needed to be saved by Christ just as all of us are saved from trials, sufferings, and death of this world. Having truly died, she was raised by her Son as the "Mother of Life" and already participates in the eternal life of paradise which is prepared and promised to all who "hear the word of God and keep it." (Luke 11:27-28) Finally, we celebrate the fact that what happens to Mary happens to all who imitate her holy life of humility, obedience and love.

It is important to remember that there are no relics of the Theotokos. Their existence has never been mentioned throughout history. At one time in Constantinople there was a center of pilgrimage where the belt and veil of the Virgin were venerated.

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SPECIFICS about Fasting/Feasts (in the Summer):

Transfiguration/Dormition Fast begins Tuesday August 1th & ends Tuesday August 15th.

Please bring Arto, Communion wine & oil, may we always have our table full!

During this fast, we fast from meats/dairy/fish/wine and olive oil, seafood is permitted. On Saturdays/ Sundays we eat olive oil & wine. Wednesdays & Fridays is the regular Fast!

On the Transfiguration (Tues., Aug 6), we also partake of fish, to celebrate the day/Event!

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<u>Church Needs</u> (during the summer):

Transfiguration of the Lord – August 6: Everyone is asked to bring grapes.

They should be washed & cut up into small bunches.

Also Lenten ARTO if possible.

Dormition of the Theotokos – **August 15**: Everyone should try to bring **ARTOKLASIA** (the 5 loaves). Also oil.... We do not need any wine.

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Confession.

On Sunday Aug 6, after Liturgy, Fr Basil will remain in church for short (10 min.) confession. Please call office to be put on list.
